Greyhound Adoption Program QLD Newsletter

The Greyhound Adoption Program (GAP) QLD is run by the Queensland Racing Integrity Commission (QRIC) and is dedicated to finding homes for greyhounds that have retired from racing or are otherwise in need of a family.

FROM THE CANINE HEALTH OFFICERS 🤼







In the Queensland Summer months, cane toads are more wide-spread and are toxic. Animal poisoning occurs when the toad releases its toxins and animals come into contact with the toad - via the mucous membranes - the gums, eyes, nose and tongue.

The toxins are released by the toad when they are threatened or attacked. It is fast acting and will absorb into the animal's bloodstream via the mucous membranes into the blood stream where it can target the heart, GI tract and nervous system.

It is important to remember that cane toads are poisonous at all stages of their life cycle - even when they are dead. Animals are only safe once the toad has completely decomposed.

If you suspect your greyhound has encountered a toad, the first priority should be to remove the toxin from their gums, and follow these steps:

- 1. Use a damp cloth/towel to wipe the gums, tongue and roof of mouth (NEVER use a hose to clean out the dog's mouth).
- 2. Wash the cloth thoroughly between wipes.
- 3. Continue this process for 10-20 minutes until the slimy coating is removed.
- 4. In mild cases, the above first aid steps will be all that is needed. However, the survival rate for animals exposed to toad poisoning decreases the longer you wait. So, please check with your vet even after the toxin is removed.



If you are welcoming a newly adopted greyhound into your home over the Christmas period or opening up your home to host a greyhound for the holidays, then these simple tips will help both you and your new house guest settle in quicker.

Establish a routine. Dogs need consistency to settle in especially during the festive season when everything is out of the ordinary. Stick to a regular schedule for meals, walks, toilet breaks and bedtime (even if you're on holiday) so your dog is ready when your schedule returns to normal.

Ease separation anxiety. Over the holidays, dogs may get used to constant company. Help them build independence by scheduling alone time with treats, toys, or the radio on. When you leave or return – do so calmly to reduce anxiety. **Go Slow**. During the first few months, avoid crowded areas and focus on calm, quiet walks. This will help train your dog and allow it an opportunity to adjust without stress.

Desensitisation: the value of a well-handled dog

We all love to give our dogs a good pat. Have you thought about the benefits of your dog being able to enjoy pats on different areas of their body?

Teaching your dog to tolerate, and hopefully enjoy being held and handled allows us to safely take our dog to places like the Vet for their annual needles, check-ups or in times of sickness. It enables us to take our dogs to the groomer for their bath without stress. To be able to clip our dogs' nails without fear of them pulling their leg away. Actively teaching your dog to have their collar handled so, that when we need to put them onto their lead there is nothing but a happy compliance.

With safety in mind, begin working within your dogs' comfort levels to touch and look inside both ears, look at and run your hands over both eyes and look inside their mouth if you are confident enough to do so and the dog allows. Hold each paw and feel the webbing between their toes for short times to begin with and then extend those times. Handle the tail and also the area around their legs. Of course, don't forget the rest of the body, under the arms and the belly area.

You can start introducing grooming tools like brushes and nail clippers when you feel both yourself and the dog are ready to tackle this next level.

Keep these actions short and sweet to begin with and always shower your dog with praise when they give you the best that they can.

Green collar accreditation provides an exemption from muzzling in a local council area where muzzling would otherwise be required under the *Animal Management (Cats and Dogs) Act 2008*.
