FROM THE CANINE HEALTH OFFICERS 🤼



Christmas time treats - please avoid giving these to your greyhound and keep an eye out for other hazards.

Christmas is a season of sharing but many holiday foods and treats can be harmful to pets because they're not made for their digestion.

To keep your greyhound safe, here's a list of festive foods to **avoid**:

- Christmas ham and fatty offcuts
- Chocolate
- Grapes, sultanas and raisins
- Macadamia nuts
- Cooked bones
- Onions/garlic
- Alcohol

Also, please ensure these don't create a hazard:

- Christmas trees and decorations/lights
- Batteries
- Xylitol
- Lillies/house plants.



ADOPTING A GREYHOUND

This incredibly adorable action that our greyhounds perform where their front of body lowers, and their rear ends stay raised has a few different meanings. And, the circumstances surrounding when this happens can provide you with a good indication as to what your dog is telling you.

The 'I Just Got out of Bed' Bow

This one is probably the clearest cut of them all. In almost all circumstances, this bow is done in preparation of movement by helping stretch those back and tummy muscles and to prepare them for the next task at hand. Technically this is known as pandiculation.

The 'I Love You' Bow

This is a fantastic way to be greeted by your dog. A great number of dogs will do this particularly when you just get home to let you know how happy they are to see you. It doesn't have the intensity and cheekiness behind it like the Play Bow. This is a sign of affection from your dog to you.

The 'Play' Bow

This is a signal to people, dogs, or other animals that they are ready to play. An invitation by your dog to engage someone else in some fun. It is quite often coupled with a soft wagging tail, a cheeky look in their eye and a grin from their slightly open mouth. This is an attention seeking behaviour performed by your dog.

The 'Prey' Bow

This is a tougher one to pick to the untrained eye and in most cases the tail is in a much higher position and the dog's body has a slight backwards lean. This allows them to spring forward quickly chasing after the object they are intently fixed on. The mouth is typically closed in this circumstance as tension for the chase is building up.

The 'On Command' Bow

You can teach you greyhound to bow on command if you have the time and patience to do so. As always, rewards such as treats can help in this situation. The only other thing that needs to be thought about here is which word and hand signals you are going to use to ignite the action.

The 'Excessive' Bow

If your greyhound is bowing a little too regularly and at times that seem odd, it could be a sign of an underlying medical condition. As always, seek veterinary advice if this is the case.

What's on the menu: helping your dog beat the heat in North Queensland

Here are some 'cool' treats to help your greyhound chill out this summer:

Frozen breakfast

- Place 2 cups of dry food in ice cream container
- · Fill it with water
- Add a teaspoon of vegemite
- Freeze overnight
- On the next morning, take the container out and feed it to your greyhound for breakfast.

Yoghurt ice-creams

- Using a silicone cupcake tray, place yoghurt (this can be watered down) in the tray
- Use a chicken neck as the stick and stick it in yoghurt
- Allow to freeze overnight.

GREEN COLLAR ASSESSMENT



Did you know you can still have your retired racer assessed for a green collar even if you didn't adopt your greyhound with GAP?

Green collar accreditation provides an exemption from muzzling in a local council area where muzzling would otherwise be required under the *Animal Management (Cats and Dogs) Act 2008*.
